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COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is a study of Pediatrics which is a study of childhood diseases, and childcare from infancy through adolescence. Pediatrics will focus on the care of the well and the ill child utilizing the nursing process. Medication administration and dosage calculations for the appropriate weight of the child will be discussed throughout the book.

COURSE GOAL:

To develop an understanding of the special needs, and pathological variations from normal function in order to meet the total needs of the pediatric patient.

I. GENERAL COURSE INFORMATION

B. Class Attendance Policy:

There are no excused absences in the Vocational Nursing Program. Roll is taken for each class. A student who is not present when roll is checked is "absent." A

student must sign in for each class; if a student fails to sign in, the student is marked "absent." Students are not allowed to disrupt the class for tardiness. A tardy student may come into the classroom following a break. The student must sign in, but the student will still be counted absent. A student who leaves before the end of class is counted absent.

<u>CLASSROOM ATTENDANCE</u>: Learning is fostered in the classroom environment. Missing even one lecture/class activity can negatively impact student performance; therefore, classroom attendance is mandatory and students are accountable to attend and be on time for class.

Level 3: In this Level, more time is spent in the clinical setting rather than the classroom. The student may have no more than two (2) absences during the Level 3 semester—this is less than one time per each course. If a student has an illness or a situation which requires both absences in the same course, the student MUST bring a physician's excuse/release or a court order or some other "official" documentation as to why the student had to be absent. "Unused" absences do not roll over to the next semester.

A student who misses more than 1 class day in this course and does not bring the required documentation (as stated above) does not meet the Course Objectives and must withdraw from the VNP with an "F".

A student who misses more than 2 class days in this semester cannot meet the Course Objectives and must withdraw from the VNP with a "F."

C. Examination Policy

Students are expected to take all examinations for each nursing course. There are **NO** make-up exams for this course. Since the final exam is comprehensive (meaning that it covers the entire course), the final exam grade will <u>also count</u> as the missed exam grade. A grade of a "0" will be recorded on the grade sheet where the missed exam is. After you take the final exam, example: you make an 80 on the final, then an 80 will be recorded where the missed exam grade would go and for the final. If any additional exams are missed, a grade of "0" will be recorded. You can only use the final exam grade to replace one "0".

No caps or hats may be worn during an exam. No backpacks or books are allowed in the room during an exam. If long sleeves are worn, they must be rolled up during an exam.

Cell phones are not allowed. If one rings during an exam this paper will be taken up and a grade of "50" will be given regardless of which question you were on.

D. Grading Policy

Unit Exams: 60% Quizzes/Participation: 10% Final Exam: 30%

In the interest of consistency, all grades will be calculated as follows:

Unit exams will not be rounded.

The Final course grades **ARE NOT** rounded up. i.e.: 79.4 is a 79.4

The grading scale for this course is the same as for all other vocational nursing courses: Grading Scale:

A = 90 - 100

B = 80 - 89.9

C = 77 - 79.9

D = 70 - 76.9

F = 69.9 and below

- 1. Grades are recorded on an Excel program that calculates the average of grades.
- 2. Each student should know current course averages for all classes.
- 3. Students must earn a "C" or better in this class for progression.
- 4. Students have the opportunity to review all grades as they are recorded. Should the student have any questions about a specific grade or specific test question, the student must discuss this with the instructor before taking the next scheduled exam. Once the next scheduled exam is taken the student may no longer question the grade or any question, the assigned grade is considered final and may not be challenged at the end of the course. The final exam may not be reviewed.
