5. Describe accepted approaches and standards in psychological assessment and evaluation.
6. Identify factors in physiological and psychological processes involved in human behavior.

Course Evaluation: See the instructor's course information sheet for specific items used in evaluating student performance. However, all courses have multiple exams and writing assignments designated by the instructor.

Attendance Policy: Instructors' attendance policies will be consistent with the *SPC General Catalog* "Class Attendance" policies; specific instructor attendance policies are found in the later part of the syllabus.

Students are expected to attend all classes in order to be successful in a course. The student may be administratively withdrawn from the course when absences become excessive as defined in the course syllabus. When an unavoidable reason for class absence arises, such as illness, an official trip authorized by the college or an official activity, the instructor may permit the student to make up work missed. It is the student's responsibility to complete work missed within a reasonable period of time as determined by the instructor. Students are officially enrolled in all courses for which they pay tuition and fees at the time of registration. Should a student, for any reason, delay in reporting to a class after official enrollment, absences will be attributed to the student from the first class meeting.

Students who enroll in a course but have "Never Attended" by the official census date, as reported by the faculty member, will be administratively dropped by the Office of Admissions and Records. A student who does not meet the attendance requirements of a class as stated in the course syllabus and does not officially withdraw from that course

by the official census date of the semester, may be administratively withdrawn from that course and receive a grade of "X" or "F" as determined by the instructor. Instructors are responsible for clearly stating their administrative drop policy in the course syllabus, and it is the student's responsibility to be aware of that policy.

It is the student's responsibility to verify administrative drops for excessive absences through MySPC using his or her student online account. If it is determined that a student is awarded financial aid for a class or classes in which the student never attended or participated, the financial aid award will be adjusted in accordance with the classes in which the student did attend/participate and the student will owe any balance resulting from the adjustment.

Plagiarism and Cheating: Students are expected to do their own work on all projects, quizzes, assignments, examinations, and papers. Failure to comply with this policy will result in an F for the assignment and can result in an F for the course if circumstances warrant.

Plagiarism violations include, but are not limited to, the following:

1. Turning in a paper that has been purchased, borrowed, or downloaded from another student, an online term paper site, or a mail order term paper mill;
2. Cutting and pasting together information from books, articles, other papers, or online sites without providing proper documentation;
3. Using direct quotations (three or more words) from a source without showing them to be direct quotations and citing them; or
4. Missing in-text citations.

Cheating violations include, but are not limited to, the following:

1. Obtaining an examination by stealing or collusion;
2. Discovering the content of an examination before it is given;
3. Using an unauthorized source of information (notes, textbook, text messaging, internet, apps) during an examination, quiz, or homework assignment;
4. Entering an office or building to obtain unfair advantage;
5. Taking an examination for another;
6. Altering grade records;
7. Copying another's work during an examination or on a homework assignment;
8. Rewriting another student's work in Peer Editing so that the writing is no longer the original student's;
9. Taking pictures of a test, test answers, or someone else's paper.

South Plains College provides students with free access to an SPC Google email account, Microsoft Word, Excel, PowerPoint and One Drive. You can access your SPC email and these Microsoft apps by going to <https://office.com> and using the username and password provided in your SPC acceptance letter to sign in. You can also access SPC/Outlook email through MySPC. If needed, contact the **help desk** at helpdesk@southplainscollege.edu or (806)716-2600.

WHAT TECHNOLOGY & MATERIALS ARE REQUIRED FOR THIS COURSE?

Blackboard

Your reading assignments, quizzes and other course resources are located on Blackboard. You can access Blackboard at <https://southplainscollege.blackboard.com>, and log in with your SPC username and password. Once logged in, you will see a list of classes in which you are enrolled (including PSYC2301). Click on the class whose Blackboard page you want to enter.

Noba Project Textbook *and* Perusall Reading App

The FREE textbook we will use is *Noba Textbook Series: Psychology*, R. Biswas-Diener & E. Diener (Eds), Champaign, IL: DEF Publishers. DOI: nobaproject.com. I have copied each assigned chapter into a reading + discussion app called Perusall.

What is Perusall? Perusall is a free app that allows students to read and discuss each chapter with their classmates. Perusall automatically records and grades your work on reading + discussion assignments. To access assigned readings in the app, you must 1) log onto Blackboard and click on PSYC2301 in your “Courses” list, 2) navigate to a Unit folder under the “Content” tab, and 3) click on a “Perusall” link which opens the Perusall reading app. Within Blackboard, the Perusall app is symbolized with a rocket ship icon: 🚀. *Do NOT log into Perusall from their homepage—if you do, your work will not sync into the Blackboard gradebook.* You can find detailed information about “How Perusall Works” in the “Start Here” module on Blackboard.

Access to a working computer with internet connection

To complete reading assignments and quizzes, you must have regular access to a computer with the following characteristics:

- A modern operating system; class content is compatible with Mac OS and Windows 8 or later
- Google Chrome to access Blackboard and take your quizzes
 - Link: [download Google Chrome](#).
- The Honorlock extension added to Chrome to take your proctored quizzes
 - Link for Honorlock Chrome extension: <https://app.honorlock.com/install/extension>
- A stable, reliable internet connection. High-speed internet (e.g., Cable, DSL, fiber) is the most reliable.
- The **Blackboard app for smartphones** can be used to access announcements, readings, videos, and grades. However, a laptop or desktop computer must be used for quizzes.

HOW THIS COURSE IS STRUCTURED

This is a 16-week course, divided into 4 Units of material. Each Unit covers 3-4 weeks of the material discussed in class. In Blackboard, you will find Unit folders that contain links to the assigned readings/discussions (these are required and graded), and the quiz for each unit. At the end of each unit, you will take an in-class exam over the material.

REQUIRED COURSEWORK AND GRADES

Perusall Interactive Reading + Discussion Assignments

PURPOSE: Reading and discussing each chapter introduces you to foundational topics in psychology. By actively discussing chapter topics with classmates, you will:

- understand reading material better and be able to apply psychological concepts to your life
- acquire knowledge and improve recall of material that is key to successfully completing quizzes and exams,
- benefit from social interaction and connections with classmates,
- improve your reading, writing and discussion skills, helping you meet SPC’s communication skills objective

TASK: Log in to Blackboard and use the Perusall App to read and discuss assigned chapters with classmates. To do this:

- click on a Perusall link in Blackboard, which “launches” you into the Perusall app and into a specific chapter
- as you read, highlight SMALL sections of the text (not entire sentences or paragraphs). This will open a text box where you type comments or questions about the reading for your classmates to read and reply to
- as you read, reply to and/or upvote (e.g., “like”) the comments and questions posted by your classmates

GRADING CRITERIA:

- Each Perusall assignment is worth 5 points.
- Your Perusall points (or your Perusall grades) are based on:
 - the quality of comments, questions and replies you post (see handout re: high-quality Perusall comments),
 - the quantity (#) of your posts—aim for 4-5 *high-quality* posts, but no more than 7-8,
 - how much you upvoted your classmates' posts, and how much classmates upvoted your posts,
 - active time spent on the assignment, and
 - reading and posting comments throughout the *entire* chapter
- There are 13 Perusall assignments this semester
- Your 2 lowest Perusall assignment grades will be dropped
- The highest possible point total on your top 11 Perusall assignments X 5 points = 55 points (10% of your final grade)

Four Quizzes (completed on Blackboard)

PURPOSE: Quizzes will help test your memory for and understanding of the readings and classroom discussion. In addition, *quizzes will prepare you for exams which cover the same material and include similar questions.* Because I want to measure your *personal* understanding of material, **each quiz is proctored using Honorlock and you are *not* allowed to search for answers on another device (find out more about Honorlock below).**

TASK: When we finish (or almost finish) discussing the material in a unit, go to Blackboard and take the quiz by the due date.

- For each quiz, you have three attempts; your highest quiz attempt will count toward your grade.
- I advise you to **take all three attempts**, because the 20 questions on the quiz are *randomly drawn* from a set of 35-45 questions, so the questions for your first attempt will *not* be identical to the questions on your second or third attempt. Thus, the more attempts you complete, the more questions you are exposed to, and you have a better idea of what the exam questions will cover.
- While you are taking your quiz, you are free to use your notes and handouts from class
- During quizzes, you are NOT allowed to search for answers online using a computer, phone or other device.
- Review the correct and incorrect answers from your last quiz attempt(s) before taking your next quiz attempts
- Before the exam, **review all** your quiz attempts to see the correct answers and ensure you understand the material.

GRADING CRITERIA:

- There are 4 comprehension quizzes, each quiz contains 20 multiple choice questions and is worth 20 points.
- You get *three attempts* on each quiz, and your highest attempt counts as your grade for the quiz.
- The highest possible point total on your 4 quizzes X 20 points = 80 points (or 15% of your final grade).

Honorlock

Honorlock will proctor quizzes to encourage academic integrity of students. Honorlock allows you to take quizzes from your home or school computer. You DO NOT need to create an account or schedule an appointment. Honorlock is available 24/7. All that is required is a computer, working webcam/microphone, picture ID, and stable internet connection.

To start, you need to open Google Chrome and download the [Honorlock Chrome Extension](#). Next, you should check your device to make sure it meets the minimum system requirements: [Honorlock MSRs](#).

When you are ready to take a quiz, log into Blackboard using Google Chrome, go to PSYC 2301, and click on the quiz. Click "Launch Proctoring" to begin the Honorlock authentication process, during which you will take a picture of yourself and show your ID. Honorlock will record your session via your webcam and microphone and record your screen. Honorlock has an integrity algorithm that detects search-engine use on nearby devices, so please do not search for answers. **IMPORTANT: While you are not allowed to search for information online during an exam, you ARE allowed to use your notes and handouts.**

Four Exams (completed in class)

PURPOSE: Each exam is a *summary* of your understanding and memory for the material covered in each unit.

TASK: Take the in-class exam on the scheduled exam day.

- You get **one attempt** on in-class exams, so make sure you are present and prepared by reviewing your quiz attempts, the readings, handouts and your notes.
- During the exam, you are allowed to use a 4X6 notecard as a “support sheet”.

GRADING CRITERIA:

- Each exam contains 35-45 multiple choice questions and is graded on a 100-point scale.
- There are 4 exams, each worth 100 points, for a total of 400 points, or 75% of your final grade.

Late Work or Missing Work

Because I drop everyone’s two lowest Perusall assignment grades, *Perusall assignments cannot be made up if missed*, regardless of the reason for missing the assignment. I drop the two lowest grades in case a student is too sick to complete an assignment or has an emergency that requires their time and attention.

Remember, the purpose of quizzes is to help you prepare for exams. Thus, quizzes will be open and available on Blackboard *at least 48 hours prior to exams*. Pay attention to due dates and intentionally work quizzes into your schedule.

The only accepted excuse for missing a quiz or an exam is illness or personal/family emergency. A make-up for a missed quiz or exam will be granted *if* a student provides official documentation (e.g., doctor’s note or similar). Make-ups must be completed within one week of the original due date, or one week of a student’s return to class (if ill or hospitalized).

NOTE: The only computer issue that warrants a make-up is if the entire class is unable to access Blackboard at the time a Perusall assignment or quiz is due. If this occurs, I will extend the due date for the entire class. Please read about how to prevent and deal with technology problems in the sections below.

OTHER IMPORTANT POLICIES AND INFORMATION:

Attendance, Drops, and Withdraws:

You have registered for a face-to-face class which means that the vast majority of course material will be presented in the classroom. Thus, I expect students to attend regularly, and I will take roll each day. To minimize distractions and maximize learning, I require students to silence their phones and store them out of sight in a bag, purse or backpack (*not* in your lap, chair or on desk). I also ask everyone to please arrive on time and take care of personal needs (e.g., visit the restroom, get a drink, make a call or text, etc.) either before or after class.

I have the right to drop a student for non-attendance, incomplete work, and/or disruptive behavior; however, I let students chart their own destiny. Approach your courses with honesty, responsibility and maturity, and recognize if you cannot put appropriate effort or time into passing a course, or if your grade is beyond repair. In these cases, it is up to you to withdraw.

If you are struggling, please reach out to discuss your grade average. Based on our conversation, you can decide whether to remain enrolled or withdraw from the course. I cannot assume that a student's missing work or lack of attendance is a request to be dropped. If you choose to withdraw from the course, you may do so by completing the "Student Drop Form" found at this link: <https://www.southplainscollege.edu/admission-aid/apply/schedulechanges.php>.

Perusall and Classroom Expectations:

While differing opinions are welcome in Perusall and classroom discussions, I expect respectful communication among students and with me. Disagreement is acceptable when discussions focus on understanding and being curious about other's viewpoints, rather than convincing the other person that you are right. Furthermore, do your best to ground discussions in the *science of psychology, or science in general*, rather than personal opinions, because science provides the most accurate and unbiased understanding of human behavior and thought.

Academic Integrity and Appropriate vs Inappropriate AI Use

Students are expected to do their own work on all quizzes, Perusall assignments, and abide by the Honorlock quiz and exam policies. Failure to comply (e.g., plagiarism, cheating, improper use of AI, use of a smartphone during a quiz or exam, etc.) will result in an F for the assignment and possibly an F for the course.

Appropriate use includes asking AI to clarify a concept you read about, or a concept discussed in a video you watched. Appropriate use also means that you recognize that the information provided by AI could be wrong, and you critically analyze the sources that AI used (often listed at the end of the AI explanation).

Inappropriate use includes 1) asking AI to generate discussion questions, comments or replies and presenting those ideas as your own, 2) asking AI to answer quiz questions, and 3) assuming AI answers are correct, complete and unbiased.
