Required Materials: School issued iPad, 3 ring binder or pocket folder with brads. Recommended: wired headphones with USB-C connection.

Course Textbook: Boyles, Peggy Palo, et al. *Texas Auténtico*. Pearson, 2018.

Course Description: SPAN 1412. This course is specifically designed for beginning Spanish students. The course includes a study of basic Spanish language skills in listening, speaking, reading, and writing within a cultural framework. Students will acquire the vocabulary and grammatical structures necessary to communicate and comprehend at the beginner level. Semester Credit Hours: 4; Pre-requisite: SPAN 1411.

Additional Information: This course is founded on interaction, communication, and culture and is geared at improving all aspects of Spanish language-speaking, listening, reading, writing and knowledge of the Hispanic culture. Strong emphasis will be placed on reading and speaking the language; therefore, the course entails a great deal of reading preparation and oral practice of the language during class time. You will exchange real-life information about yourself in a variety of activities. You will continue to acquire and improve upon your aural comprehension by listening to me and others speak in class, which will be conducted primarily in the target language (Spanish), and by listening and responding to comprehension exercises. It is recommended that you spend time outside of class exploring the Spanish language by watching Spanish-speaking programs, listening to Spanish radio or streaming stations, choosing print materials of personal interest that are in Spanish, and engaging in interactions with others that speak the language. You will continue to acquire and improve your speaking ability by using Spanish with the whole class and in small activity groups. Nevertheless, it is always important to understand the basic principles of grammar in order to become more proficient, and this will require that you learn said principles and rules, which will be discussed in English. In learning such an array of communication skills you must diligently practice and strive for improvement. It is impossible to “cram” for a language class and expect satisfactory results as communicative competence is built gradually over a period of time. You will be given ample resources to help you succeed and you will be held to high expectations in all aspects of this course.

Communication: You should communicate with me through your Lubbock-Cooper email account or in person.

Assignments: This course will address topics from Spanish 2 not thoroughly covered in the Lubbock-Cooper general Spanish 2 curriculum. Assignments should be completed by established due dates. Assignments will include readings and textbook exercises (oral and written/typed), supplementary worksheets, and any other activities designed to stimulate and reinforce foreign language acquisition. Please prepare your assignments carefully and expect to be active in the course several hours each week.

Please note that in this class, utilizing translation websites for written assignments in Spanish will not be allowed and will infringe upon the guidelines of academic integrity.

Make-up Work After Absences

Students shall be expected to make up assignments after absences. Students should inquire about work missed during their absence. The appropriate time frame for make-up work for an excused absence shall be no less than the number of days missed plus one day.

Reassessment
