Course Description: Survey of basic content and structural elements of mass media and their functions and influences on society.

Sometimes the final number of points available for the course will not reach the 900 mark or it will exceed it. If either is the case, the scale will be recalibrated and you will be notified.

Tardiness and Attendance Policy: I generally will not allow you to enter class after the first 5 minutes because it is disruptive. I will take attendance after the first 5 minutes of class. If you repeatedly come to class after the 5 minute cut off, you will be asked to leave.

Students are expected to attend all classes in order to be successful in a course. The student may be administratively withdrawn from the course when absences become excessive as defined in the course syllabus below.

When an unavoidable reason for class absence arises, such as illness, an official trip authorized by the college or an official activity, the instructor may permit the student to make up work missed. It is the student's responsibility to find out what work was missed, and it is the student's responsibility to complete work missed within a reasonable period of time as determined by the instructor. Please come to my office during office hours to find out what you missed. Please do NOT assume that I will contact you to tell you about missed work and do NOT assume you can miss class, not say anything, and then just turn an assignment in late.

Some work cannot be made up. In the event that a makeup exam is allowed, the highest grade available on it will be an 89.

Students with more than 4 absences *in a row* automatically will be dropped from the class with an F or X without further warning. If a student misses more than 4 classes *throughout the semester*, I consider this to be excessive. At that point, I reserve the right to drop the student with an X or an F. I will warn you if you reach the 4 class limit. That will be your only warning.

Students are officially enrolled in all courses for which they pay tuition and fees at the time of registration. Should a student, for any reason, delay in reporting to a class after official enrollment, absences will be attributed to the student from the first class meeting.

Students who enroll in a course but have “Never Attended” by the official census date, as reported by the faculty member, will be administratively dropped by the Office of Admissions and Records. A student who does not meet the attendance requirements of a class as stated in the course syllabus and does not officially withdraw from that course by the official census date of the semester, may be administratively withdrawn from that course and receive a grade of “X” or “F” as determined by the instructor. Instructors are responsible for clearly stating their administrative drop policy in the course syllabus, and it is the student’s responsibility to be aware of that policy.

It is the student’s responsibility to verify administrative drops for excessive absences through MySPC using his or her student online account. If it is determined that a student is awarded financial aid for a class or classes in which the student never attended or participated, the financial aid award will be adjusted in accordance with the classes in which the student did attend/participate and the student will owe any balance resulting from the adjustment.
