REQUIRED TEXTBOOK / SCORES AND EQUIPMENT

After the first class, a textbook or repertoire will be customized to meet each student's specific needs and skill levels. Additional materials will be supplied, or the instructor will recommend specific items for the students to purchase.

COURSE CONTENT AND PURPOSE

This course offers an in-depth study of piano, focusing on essential techniques that lead to ideal physical practices, effective practice methods, and a diverse repertoire across various musical styles. Students will explore appropriate musical interpretations, gain confidence in performance settings, learn improvisation, and integrate concepts from music theory and history.

The course will introduce students to music fundamentals and teach them how to express themselves through music. It will prepare them to perform at a level suitable for various contexts, including educational settings, solo performances, and participation in both small and large ensembles.

For music majors, the curriculum includes extensive study of keyboard skills to ensure full preparation for the piano proficiency exam at the end of each semester, as well as the placement test required for four-year universities.

EXPECTED LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon completion of this course, students should be able to:

- Learn fundamentals of piano learning such as posture and hand alignment, the geography of the keyboard, intervals, fingering, articulations, rhythms, the balance of melody and accompaniment, velocity, and pedaling.
- Obtain keyboard skills in Major/minor white key 5-finger patterns, scales, triads, chord cadences (I IV V V7), and arpeggios in various keys.

- Demonstrate a variety of practice techniques, leading to an ability to perform with competence on their instrument.
- Improve sightreading skills, memorization, and confidence in a live performance setting.
- Learn technical studies not only to enhance comprehension and enjoyment of playing the piano but also to prepare the piano proficiency exam for music majors.
- Integrate music theory and history into their performance preparation.
