Study and application of the methods and components of theatrical production, which may include one or more of the following: theater facilities, scenery construction and painting, properties, lighting, costume, makeup, sound, and theatrical management.

Course Requirements

Required Supplies:

- Various materials of your choosing to complete properties projects. Scale rule or 12" ruler, mechanical pencil, blank printer paper.

Clothing Requirements:

- Clothing should allow for working in the shop, climbing on the stairs, etc.
 - Suggestions are pants, shorts and t-shirts.
- Set of Paint clothes - that can be left at the Theater.

Participation/Discussion:

- Students are expected to participate in class through activities and discussion with their classmates about the application of things gleaned from plays watched/read and assigned readings.
- The instructor will lead the discussions and ensure that they remain pertinent to the topics of this class.
- Participating includes:
 - asking questions, answering questions, and initiating class discussions.
- If your final point count is on the border of two grades, I will take participation into account in either raising or lowering the border grade.
