**Course Description:** Origin and development of the Texas constitution, structure and powers of state and local government, federalism and inter-governmental relations, political participation, the election process, public policy, and the political culture of Texas.

**Course Objectives addressed:**

1. **critical thinking:** to include creative thinking, innovation, inquiry, and analysis, evaluation, and synthesis of information.
2. **communication:** to include effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral and visual communication.
3. **social responsibility:** to include intercultural competence, knowledge of civic responsibility, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national, and global communities.
4. **personal responsibility:** to include the ability to connect choices, actions, and consequences to ethical decision-making.

**Student Learning Outcomes:**

Students who have completed this course will:

1. Explain the origin and development of the Texas constitution.
2. Describe state and local political systems and their relationship with the federal government.
3. Describe separation of powers and checks and balances in both theory and practice in Texas.
4. Demonstrate knowledge of the legislative, executive, and judicial branches of Texas government.
5. Evaluate the role of public opinion, interest groups, and political parties in Texas.
6. Analyze the state and local election process.
7. Identify the rights and responsibilities of citizens.
8. Analyze issues, policies and political culture of Texas.

**Course Purpose:** Government 2306, as taught at South Plains College, is a reading intensive course designed to acquaint the learner with the origin and development of the Texas Constitution, structure and powers of state and local government, federalism and inter-governmental relations, political participation, the election process, public policy, and the political culture of Texas. This course meets the statutory requirements as set forth by the state of Texas.

**Course Requirements:** To maximize a student's potential to complete this course, he/she should attend all class meetings, complete all homework assignments and examinations in a timely manner, and complete all other projects or papers as assigned in the instructor's specific instructions.

## **Assignments**

### Quizzes (20%)

Most weeks that cover a textbook chapter will include a quiz. Generally, a quiz will have at least 10 questions (e.g., multiple choice, true/false, or free response) based on the assigned reading and videos for that particular week. While I do accept late quizzes, there is a late penalty. Moreover, your two lowest quiz grades will be dropped.

### Discussions (20%)

There are four discussion assignments in this course. Some discussion threads will be based on a current event in Texas politics, while other discussions will examine the structure of Texas government. The purpose of the discussions is for students to demonstrate their knowledge of course material and engage with other students on important topics in Texas politics.

For each discussion, you will be required to make an initial post in which you answer the question(s) posed in the prompt. After you make your initial post, you must read the posts from your fellow classmates and make two additional posts in response to posts from other students. I will accept late discussion assignments, but there will be a 10-point deduction for every day that it is late.

Finally, all students are required to maintain professional language in online discussions. If you offer criticism, do it in a polite and constructive manner. For example, avoid name-calling, curse words, and slurs. Any text that a reasonable person would find offensive will likely result in a loss of credit for the assignment. If you need further clarification, please contact the instructor.

### Short Answer Assignments (30%)

There are four short answer assignments in this course. Each assignment will ask you to answer a series of questions covering important material from the textbook and lectures. It is important that you accurately answer all parts of the questions and cite the textbook (or another reputable source) to support your answers. All short answer assignments will be submitted through Blackboard. Late short answer assignments will be accepted, but there is a late penalty.

### Letter to the Editor (10%)

This assignment requires you to critically read and assess a newspaper article or editorial. Then, you will write a letter to the editor in which you develop a persuasive argument and a call to action. More information on this assignment will be provided to you later in the semester.

### Exams (20%)

There are two exams (midterm and final) in this course. Both exams will have multiple-choice and possibly some true/false or free response questions.
