Course Description

The course will give the student an examination of historical, cultural, religious, and environmental impacts on the development of various cultures worldwide. The course will also examine some current events and the local, regional, and global impact of these events. A general breakdown of the topics covered is at the end of this syllabus.

Course Materials

The text we will be using is an open-source textbook, [World Regional Geography](#) by Caitlin Finlayson. The book can be found at the link above. There is no cost to download the book.

It is highly recommended you download the book for ease of reading. The book can be downloaded in several formats. If you have issues downloading the text, please contact the instructor. The text will be used in the course and some questions on the quizzes and exams will come from the textbook.

- Students will need access to a computer with internet access. If the student does not have a laptop, one can be checked out from the SPC library.
- Materials will be found on Blackboard.
 - All assignments, exams, and quizzes will be completed/submitted on Blackboard unless otherwise specifically directed by the instructor.

Course Objectives:

1. Critical thinking: to include creative thinking, innovation, inquiry, and analysis, evaluation, and synthesis of information.
2. Communication: to include effective development, interpretation, and expression of ideas through written, oral, and visual communication.
3. Empirical & Quantitative Skills: to include the manipulation and analysis of numerical data or observable facts resulting in informed conclusions.

4. Teamwork: to include the ability to consider different points of view and work effectively with others to support a shared purpose or goal
5. Personal Responsibility: to include the ability to connect choices, actions, and consequences to ethical decision-making.
6. Social Responsibility: to include the demonstrated knowledge and competence of local, national, and global issues, knowledge of civic responsibility, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national, and global communities.

The course objectives will be obtained in the following manner:

- For face-to-face classes:
 - Interaction with the instructor and classmates through class discussion and participation. Exhibition of understanding of presented material through online quizzes and exams.
- For online classes:
 - Participation in the class by reviewing materials posted online in Blackboard and exhibition of understanding of class materials through online quizzes and exams.

Grading

Grading will be based on the following breakdown:

- Exams – 50%
- Quizzes – 30%
- Assignments – 20%

There will be three (3) exams during the semester. Each exam will consist of multiple choice and true/false questions. Exam questions will be taken from the lecture materials, textbook, supplemental videos, and articles provided during the semester. All materials can be found in the course folder on Blackboard and in Perusall.

Assignments and quizzes will be given at various times during the semester and will be found in the weekly folders on Blackboard. All assignments, quizzes, and exams must be submitted on Blackboard. Assignments e-mailed to the instructor, unless otherwise directed by the instructor, will not be accepted. If there is an issue uploading the assignment, please contact the instructor immediately. Late assignments will not be accepted. Do not provide a link to an assignment. The assignment must be uploaded or completed in Blackboard. You may type your response in a Word document and upload it as a document to Blackboard.

The grading scale will be:

- F = 0 – 60

- If a student receives a final grade ending in .5 or higher, the grade will be rounded up to the next whole number (e.g.: 89.5 would be rounded up to 90).
- If a student received a final grade ending in .4 or lower, the grade will be rounded down to the previous whole number (e.g.: 89.4 would be rounded down to 89).

- Instructions will be delivered according to the section of the course the student is registered in. There are three formats for this course:
 - Face-to-face course – students will meet at a specified time and location for class lecture.

 - Online course – material will be presented through video lectures and supplemental materials.
 - Each student will need:
 - Appropriate technological skill and technology to complete the class.

 - Computer labs are available at each of the SPC campuses.
 - Daily internet access.

Course Purpose

To provide the students with a familiarization of the cultural, socio-economic, and political environments of the past and present.

Honors Course Option

For students eager to explore the complexities of our world in greater depth, an Honors Course Option is available. This program offers highly motivated students the chance to dive into a specific regional topic or issue that sparks their interest, extending beyond the standard course material. It's a fantastic opportunity to conduct independent research and analysis on a global scale.

The student interested in the honors course option will need to meet with the instructor to review the items below and discuss the Honors Program Showcase requirements. A copy of this document will be provided at the meeting by the instructor.

Requirements for the Honors Option:

- **Comprehensive Project Development:** You'll develop a comprehensive project focused on a specific region or a comparative study of multiple regions discussed in World Regional Geography. The exact nature of this project will be determined through conversations with the instructor, allowing you to tailor it to your specific interests. Examples of projects include:
 - An in-depth research paper analyzing a particular region's development challenges (e.g., food security in Sub-Saharan Africa, urbanization in East Asia, political transitions in Eastern Europe).
 - A comparative study of two regions focusing on a specific theme (e.g., renewable energy adoption in Western Europe vs. North America, the impacts of climate change on coastal communities in Southeast Asia vs. Latin America).
 - A detailed case study of a specific cultural landscape, geopolitical conflict, or significant demographic shift within a region. The student will focus on a region not discussed in the course.

- A project utilizing data analysis of socioeconomic indicators to explore regional disparities or trends.
- *Monthly Progress Meetings:* You must meet with the instructor at least once a month to discuss your project's progress. These meetings can be in person or virtual. Please come prepared to share your work, discuss any initial findings, and ask questions. These check-ins serve as your primary progress updates; there are no other intermediate deadlines for project components.
- *Final Project Submission:* Your completed final project is due on the first day of final exams for the current semester. The specific deliverable will depend on your project's nature and could be a formal paper, a story map, or another appropriate artifact agreed upon during our discussions.
- *Grading:* Your final project will be evaluated using a rubric designed specifically for your project's scope and deliverables, ensuring a fair and transparent assessment of your work.

If you wish to pursue the Honors Option, you must register for the specific honors section of this course through the Registrar's Office. You can complete this during the regular course registration period. The deadline to register for an honors section is the last day of course registration for the current semester.
