

## **Nursing Programs Technical Standards**

## **TECHNICAL STANDARDS AND ESSENTIAL FUNCTIONS**

South Plains College's Associate Degree Nursing Program and Vocational Nursing Program has established technical standards and essential functions for the program. The ability to meet these standards and essential functions, with or without reasonable accommodations, is required in order to satisfactorily complete the program.

Observation	.Ability to participate actively in all demonstrations, laboratory exercise, and clinical experiences in the professional program component and to assess and comprehend the condition of all patients assigned to him/her for examination, diagnosis, and treatment. Such observation and information requires functional use of visual, auditory, and somatic sensations.	•	Able to visually discriminate increment readings on syringes, sphygmomanometers and other various medical equipment. Assess skin color (cyanosis, pallor) and visually discriminate different colored objects. Assess the environment from a distance.  y (corrected as necessary) Respond to normal speaking level sounds, even under personal protective equipment (PPE). Distinguish between normal and abnormal lung and heart sounds, evaluate blood pressure. Respond to auditory alarms such as monitors, fire alarms, and patient call bells, in a quick and safe manner.  Ability to detect odors from patient (foul smelling drainage, alcohol breath), and smoke.

Interpersonal Skills	Emotional stability and appropriate behavior sufficient to assume responsibility/accountability for actions.	•	Use of internet browser and search engines for specific topics. Professional Conduct	Ability to reason morally and practice nursing in an ethical manner.	•	Willingness to learn and abide by professional standards of practice. Attributes that include compassion, empathy, altruism, integrity, honesty, responsibility and tolerance. Ability to engage in patient care delivery in all settings and ability to deliver care to all patient populations including but not limited to children, adolescents, adults, individuals with disabilities, medically compromised patients and vulnerable adults.
